Welcome

Welcome to a new school year! It is an absolute pleasure to welcome you all back and, to our new families, I am looking forward to getting to know you and your children as the year progresses.

I hope many of you are able to attend our Parent Information Evening on the Grandstand this Monday (February 5). This is an hour-long informal event starting at 7pm which gives families an opportunity to 'put a face to the name'.

We are very excited to have an enthusiastic group of teachers join our campus. Some have been teaching at other schools, whilst for others this is their first time in charge of their own classes. They are settling in well, and are keen to work with your children to help them develop their full potential.

There have also been some additions to the campus's leadership team. These are outlined below.

With so many teachers and leadership members on the secondary site, it can be confusing knowing who to contact when issues arise. Hopefully the following helps to clarify who is best placed to assist students and parents/caregivers:

Subject teachers are responsible for designing and implementing lessons and assessment tasks for students in their subjects, including those with additional learning needs. Parents/caregivers are well within their rights to view these at any time, and to request information on their children's progress. Any issues or queries relating to course content, assignments and homework should be directed to the subject teacher in the first instance.

Caregroup teachers are the first port of call for parents and caregivers when it comes to uniform, attendance/absence and pastoral care. Most questions can be answered by, or issues dealt with, caregroup teachers, but more serious matters will be referred to House Leaders

House Leaders oversee student wellbeing, including ongoing absences or uniform infractions and student behaviour. Depending on the nature of parent/ caregiver concerns, they will deal with matters themselves, refer them to caregroup teachers or work with a Director of Students.

The **Directors of Students** work with parents/ caregivers and students to resolve serious and/or on-going matters such as repeated misbehaviour and bullying. If required, these matters can also be handled by the Head of Campus and/or the Deputy Principal.

The **Director of Campus Administration and Inclusive Education** oversees timetabling and the implementation of curriculum for students on modified programs, for example, students with additional learning needs.

The Assistant Principal – Teaching and Learning oversees curriculum across Samaritan's three campuses, up to Year 10. She is supported on the secondary campus by the Assistant Leader of Learning.

The Assistant Principal – Head of Campus oversees VET as well as having the ultimate responsibility for student behaviour.

The **SACE and Careers Coordinator** oversees the SACE curriculum, including resulting, as well as careers and work experience.

If you are unsure whom to contact with your query, please provide a brief overview to the front office staff and they will direct you to the appropriate staff member.
