Prepare us for tomorrow. Tasting the fullness of what we have today, let us experience some hunger tomorrow. May our fasting make us more alert and may it heighten our consciousness so that we might be ready to hear your Word and respond to your call. Yesterday marked the start of Lent, when we commemorated Ash Wednesday. The phases of the moon determines when Easter is each year and then Ash Wednesday is 46 days before Easter (the 40 days of Lent is minus the Sundays). The distribution of ashes reminds us of our own mortality and calls us to repentance and is a time to take stock of our spiritual lives.

We are very proud of our college community for the way they 'embrace' Lent, whether it be the reverence shown at all Ash Wednesday Liturgies held across the three campuses or the donations for eating pancakes on Shrove Tuesday; to the way the students take on the responsibility of helping those less fortunate than themselves through Caritas Australia's Project Compassion's work. The students also understand and act out their awareness that their work for Project Compassion is more than simply placing coins in a box. The teachable moments for promoting social action during Lent are quite significant.

Staff Formation Days

Each year the college commits to a range of staff formation/training days i.e. student free days. These are done in accordance with the Enterprise Agreement for staff which requires some training to be done in 'school' time. Some schools have regular early finishes i.e. every second Tuesday at 2pm and some, like us, utilise the whole day closure of the school.

Although his feast day is not on the Catholic calendar anymore, he is not only the Patron Saint to couples but also to beekeepers and fainting. Quite an interesting combination!

The LifeSkillsGO curriculum is well underway at our **primary** campuses. The focus this term is on identifying, communicating and managing emotions, beginning with Calm/Nervous and Happy/Angry.

Other lessons include practicing mindfulness in the classroom which has benefits such as relaxing the body and mind, reducing worries and stress, building resilience, and helping children to focus on the present moment.

At **secondary** we have again chosen to partner with Resilient Youth Australia who have surveyed more than 350,000 Australian school students aged 8-18 over recent years.

We will administer the 2024 Youth Survey this year online in class time in early April. Students typically take 20-25 minutes to complete the survey.

The data from the survey will be reported in aggregate descriptive form only, by year level and gender, and no individual student responses can be identified.

The Resilient Youth Survey is completely voluntary and anonymous. It collects the self-reported resilience and wellbeing of students and will provide valuable information to assist us to create and maintain the best culture of wellbeing and resilience that we can. The resulting data is invaluable to us as leaders and educators.

Start to the Year

Our first two weeks of the academic year have been busy, to say the least, but such is the nature of Samaritan that there always seems to be something on. As I mentioned in our first newsletter, our Achievement Assembly was held in week one, and last week our campus had the pleasure of hosting our Opening School Mass. It is an amazing sight to see every Samaritan student assembled on the grandstand and oval, and it always amazes me how smoothly things run - as you can appreciate, having 800 or so staff and students receive communion or a blessing has the potential to go awry! I was particularly struck this year by the number of parents and caregivers who attended, and their presence was greatly appreciated.

This week we celebrated Ash Wednesday and the beginning of Lent, which also heralded the start of our major fundraiser for the year - Project Compassion. The previous day our senior SRC coordinated Shrove Tuesday activities which included egg and spoon races on the oval. Tuesday also saw our Year 8s attend workshops run by the Sammy D Foundation which aims to educate young people about the consequences of violence and encourages them to work towards a violence-free future. In Week 5 our students will attend Life Education presentations on a variety of age-appropriate topics such as cyber-safety and smoking (including vaping).

COVID

Recently I have had queries from staff and parents about COVID, in particular whether staff or students who test positive can come on site. The short answer is . . . it depends. A person who has symptoms, such as a sore throat, coughing or sneezing, should remain at home until they test negative or symptoms cease. A person who has no symptoms is permitted on campus but should wear a mask to prevent inadvertently infecting others. I respectfully ask families and students (and staff, for that matter!) to adhere to these expectations to minimise the risk to other members of the school community.

Uniform

As the weather starts to warm up and temperature hit the mid thirties and beyond, I am often asked by students and staff whether students can wear their PE uniform as part of our 'hot weather policy'. The short answer is no. Students are permitted to wear

their PE uniform when they have double PE lessons and expected to wear their formal uniform on other days. The reason for this is simple - all classrooms, including Home Ec, the Library, Tech Studies, Art and the computer room - are air conditioned, so there is no benefit to be derived by wearing PE clothes.

The Library is always open during recess and lunch and on days deemed too hot to allow students on the oval and basketball courts additional classrooms are opened to provide respite from the heat. We appreciate parent and caregiver support in this regard.

School Student Broadband Initiative (SSBI) No NBN at your House?

To boost education opportunities and narrow the digital divide, up to 30,000 eligible families without home internet can apply to access a free National Broadband Network (NBN) service. A family can nominate to receive a free service up to 31 December 2024. This free service will continue until 31 December 2025 for all existing and new families. Families can directly contact the National Referral Centre to have the eiligibility assessed or be referred by a participating nominating organisation.

To be eligible, a family must:

- Have a child living at home that is enrolled in an Australian school.
- Have no active broadband service over the NBN network.
- Live in a premise where they can access a standard NBN service.
- Not have had an active NBN service during the previous 14 days.

To check eligibility, follow these simple steps.

- Contact the National Referral Centre, operated by Anglicare Victoria, on 1800 954 610 (Mon-Fri, 10am-6pm AEDT), www.anglicarevic.org.au/student-internet
- The National Referral Centre team will help assess eligibility for the SSBI, by checking applicants' detals including applicants residentail address and current financial situation.
- If eligible, a voucher will be issued to be redeemed at any of the participating SSBI retail service providers. The National Referral Centre will also be available to assist with contacting your SSBI retail service provider of choice and providing follow-up support.
- If you believe you have a student/s who may benefit from this initiative, you will find additional information at www.infrastructure.gov.au/SSBI.

Collection Notice for parents/guardians

2024 Student Residential Address and Other Information

The Australian Government Department of Education (the department) would like to notify you that we have requested for your child's school to provide residential address and other information.

Under the Australian Education Regulations 2023, the school is required to provide the department with the following information about each student at the school:

- names and residential addresses of the student's parent(s) and/or guardian(s)
- student residential address (excluding student names)
- whether the student is a primary or secondary student (education level)
- whether the student is boarding or a day student (boarding status).

The school collects the above information by generating a **unique and unidentifiable** student reference number (SRN) for each student record. The school only uses the SRN for this collection. **The SRN cannot be used for any other purpose**. The number only indicates to the department that each record provided is for one student.

Purpose of the collection

The Student Residential Address and Other Information Collection (the collection) informs Australian Government school education policy and helps ensure funding for non-government schools is based on need.

The information collected is used to inform school funding calculations. It is combined with Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS) data to calculate a non-government school community's anticipated capacity to contribute to schooling costs.

In 2020, the department introduced a new measure of capacity to contribute: the Direct Measure of Income (DMI). The DMI is based on the median income of non-government school students' parents or guardians using the collection data. For more information see <u>Direct Measure of Income (DMI) Methodology</u>.

Use and disclosure of personal information

Your personal information is protected by law under the *Privacy Act 1988* (Cth) (the Privacy Act). Personal information is information or an opinion about an identifiable individual. Personal information includes an individual's name and contact details.

Any use or disclosure of your personal information must occur in accordance with the Privacy Act, the *Australian Education Act 2013* and Australian Education Regulations 2023.

Your personal information provided to the department through the collection may be:

- disclosed to the ABS for the purposes of capacity to contribute calculations and analysis as a part of the Multi-Agency Data Integration Project (MADIP). Find more information about MADIP on the ABS website MADIP page
- disclosed to a contracted auditor where the department may audit a school's collection submission. The contracted auditor compares the school's submission with the student enrolment information. The contracted auditor will not use the information for any other purpose

- disclosed to our service providers for the purpose of providing the department with information and communications technology support
- used or disclosed where it is otherwise required or authorised by law.

The department does not intend to disclose your personal information to any overseas recipients.

Find the department's privacy policy on the <u>Department of Education</u> website which includes information on:

- how individuals can access and modify personal information held by the department
- how complaints about potential breaches or breaches of the Privacy Act can be made
- how the department will deal with these complaints.

The department commissioned an independent Privacy Impact Assessment (PIA). The PIA assesses the flows of information under the Collection, compliance with the Privacy Act and measures in place to safeguard the personal information being collected. What do you need to do?

You are not required to do anything. Your school is responsible for providing the department with the requested details; however, you can contact the school to update your family's details.
