The Samaritan Way

"Lord Jesus Christ, open the eyes of my heart to recognize your presence with me and to understand the truth of your saving word. Nourish me with your life-giving word and with the bread of life." St Augustine

We have celebrated the Risen Jesus at Easter Sunday. But Easter is not over. The liturgical season of Easter lasts for fifty days ending at the feast of Pentecost. During that time, we hear about the appearances of Jesus to the disciples.

In Luke's Gospel we find the story of the journey to Emmaus of two of Jesus' disciples. It's about what happened on the road or on the way or on the journey, the place where many of us spend a lot of time.

The two disciples are on a journey that took them away from Jerusalem and the events that happened there. They are moving away from the salvation that was won by Jesus at his death. All they can see is the confusion and disappointment of their failed hopes and expectations. They thought Jesus was the Messiah, the one they had waited so long for, but he died on the cross.

They did not realise that Jesus would not abandon them. They did not realise that He walked with them, alongside them explaining the scriptures to the companions. As they continued their journey the two disciples felt their hearts burn within them, they became open to hearing the truth and their doubts about Jesus became less.

The most uplifting part of the story is the meal in Emmaus where the two disciples finally come to recognize that Jesus is present with them in the blessing and breaking of the bread.

Why was it so difficult for the disciples to recognize Jesus? Jesus' death scared the disciples and they lost their hopes and dreams. They did not understand that Jesus had risen and was with them until he actually appeared to them and gave them understanding.

Have there been times in your life when you have failed to recognize a truth or just couldn't see something clearly? What or who helped you to open your eyes? What was your response when things became clear?

The two companions walking along the road are us. Jesus walks with us. Have your eyes been opened to who He is and what He has done for you? Can you feel His presence in your life?

We know that at Easter Jesus rose from the dead but the story of the journey to Emmaus invites us to open our eyes, recognize Jesus in unexpected moments, and experience the joy of His resurrection knowing that Jesus walks with us now and always.

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Mobile Phones

- In recent weeks there has been an increase in students reporting lost or damaged mobile phones. Ideally such items should not be brought on site for these reasons, but we acknowledge that students may need to have their mobile phones at school. In these circumstances it is expected that students adhere to the following:
- Mobile phones must be switched off and out of sight (i.e. not used) during school hours
- Parents and students are discouraged from contacting each other via mobile phone during the day (this can be done via the Front Office)
- Students report to the Front Office if they are unwell, and staff will contact parents/caregivers (i.e. a student must not use their mobile to make personal arrangements to be picked up from school)

Failure to adhere to these rules can result in phones being confiscated for the day. Moreover, the school

cannot be held liable for any damage to mobile phones or other items that should not be brought to school
