Your choices create your future

Students in Focus: Doorways 2 Construction Program

Mrs Shivvaan, with both Mr Daw and Mr Sheedy, recently had the pleasure of visiting the Doorways to Construction students as they continued to renovate a local property. Meadow Dinedios is one of the Doorways to Construction students, and she happily agreed to answer some questions for this Careers News.

Tell me a little about the Doorways to Construction Program. What does a typical week look like for you?

Doorways Construction program is where students who are interested in the trade life can join this program to explore all trades, at doorways we explore lots of different trades including, electrician, plumbing, painting, fencing and a lot more. A typical week for me will be at school from Monday till Thursday, in that week we have 6 lessons of doorways studies to finish out theory work. We then will go to our housing property every Friday at 8 in the morning.

What inspired you to pursue vocational study in construction, and how has your perception of the industry evolved since you began the program?

At first, I always loved houses and the way they are structured, originally, I was interested in being an Architect. I then did work experience with a carpentry company to see how carpentry was, because I love building things, like houses. I really enjoyed doing the work experience and wanted to join the doorways program. Doorways has provided me with a basic knowledge in carpentry and construction and has increased my view on it as a future career. I have started to develop more skills within doorways including leadership, resilience, and strength.

Can you share a specific task you've worked on in your during the program that challenged you the most, and how did you overcome it?

What challenged me the most was cutting the gyprock sheeting's, the most challenging part for me was using the Stanley knife to neatly cut a straight line in the gyprock. I always accidently go off with the cutting and it's not a neat straight line and gets me frustrated within myself. I overcome this issue by asking either Mr Thursby or Leigh for a hand on how to have more control over the Stanley knife.

In what ways do you feel the Doorways Program is preparing you for potential future career paths in the industry?

I feel the Doorways program is preparing me by providing me with the basic knowledge on how to use power tools, tools, machine, and how to do certain type of trades. It is also preparing me for the work force and showing me what a normal day at work would feel like.

As you progress through your program, have you discovered any specific areas within construction that you find particularly intriguing or that you might like to specialize in?

Yes, I have, I really enjoy doing carpentry and construction. I would like to specialise in carpentry and construction. I also very much enjoy doing demo work, potentially even specialize in demo and how to do it the safest and most effective way.

Do you have any advice for other students who might be interested in the program?

I say if you're interested in doing the Doorways program but you're not sure what trade you want to go in, do the program. Doorways will help you with understanding all the different trades. It is also a lot of fun to do with your mates and get away from school for a day.

BAE Systems Work Experience Opportunities

Are you thinking about completing a trade or a pursuing a future career in STEM? Boost your career trajectory by undertaking a structured work experience program with BAE Systems Australia.

In addition, BAE Systems also offer trades work experience at their Osborne Naval Shipyard for Year 10, 11 and 12 students. This four-day program runs from Monday to Thursday, and we can accommodate up to five students per week. Opportunities are currently available from Monday June 24 through to the end of October.

Priority for our trades work experience program is given to school students in Years 11 and 12, however we will also consider Year 10 students.
