College News

School Counselling Program at Samaritan College

At Samaritan College, Centacare Catholic Country SA offer therapeutic counselling onsite across all campuses. School Counsellors are qualified counsellors and social workers and are trained in therapeutic interventions. Students may seek counselling for a wide range of issues such as anxiety, stress, lack of motivation, sadness, anger, conflict with others (including friends, teachers and family), grief and loss, study load, bullying, self-esteem, relationship issues, family separation or concern for a friend. School counselling is a confidential service, and counsellors are not permitted to repeat content of sessions to anyone without permission, unless there is risk to a person's safety.

Students, staff and caregivers can all refer to the service. At each campus we have a referral box with Student Counselling Referral and Intake forms placed next to these. These can be filled out and placed in the boxes which are checked regularly. This form is also on the college website, it can be filled out electronically and emailed to the relevant school counsellors

NAIDOC Week: 7 - 14 July

The theme of NAIDOC Week this year was "Keep the Fire Burning! Blak, Loud and Proud", chosen by the National NAIDOC Committee.

This theme recognises the strength and vitality of First Nations culture – with a fire symbol of connection to Country, to each other, and the traditions that define Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples.

During Week 10 at Our Lady Help of Christians Campus students engaged in many activities that helped them explore Aboriginal culture and learn about the history of Australia's First Nations people as a part of our NAIDOC Week Celebrations.

On Monday, Mrs Warren set up a campfire in the library and many students came to sit by the campfire and read stories written by First Nations Authors. Some of our favourites were Ceremony by Adam Goodes and Ellie Laing, Respect by Aunty Fay Muir and Sue Lawson, and My Kind by Eddie Betts.



On Tuesday, Mrs Warren worked with the Mullu Mullu Gullya students. We sat around the campfire and created some weaved rainbow serpents using colourful wool wrapped around cardboard.

On Wednesday, the House Captains ran an activity in which each house team read the story of the Rainbow Serpent and then worked together to create a collaborative art piece which included a colourful Rainbow Serpent.



Peaceful Kids

At Our Lady Help of Christians Campus Mrs Warren runs the Peaceful Kids Program.

Each term, a group of 6-8 students get to participate in this 8-week program, during which time they learn to identify and describe their emotions, explore the ways their body responds to different situations, and learn coping strategies that will help them to manage stress and anxiety more effectively and meditations that will help them to nourish their mind and body.

This term, a group of Year 3-6 students engaged with the program.

Some of the activities that they participated in include:

Planting a Flower which they were asked to water a little each time that they meditate at home. The flower is a metaphor to remind them that they need to nourish their mind and body with mindfulness and meditation, just as they nourish the plant with sunlight and water.

Creating playdough models of brains to demonstrate what they'd learnt about the different parts of their brain including the thinking brain (prefrontal cortex) and the emotional brain (amygdala and hippocampus). This learning helped them to better understand why it's harder for them to make good decisions when they're stressed, anxious or angry, and their "lid is flipped" meaning that their emotional brain takes over and their thinking brain isn't working effectively.

Creating "Shaky Brain Bottles" that can be used as a mindfulness tool but also act as a model of how the messages in our brain get all mixed up when we're experiencing big emotions (like the glitter and sand in the bottle does when we shake it) and how we can settle our minds using mindfulness and meditation (like how the glitter and sand settles once we stop shaking the bottle).

Students also learnt a range of meditations that support them to focus on their breathing and being more mindful and present in the moment. In the final session, they created mindfulness bracelets using wool and three beads that will help them to practice the "Three Great Things" meditation that was learnt and practiced many times throughout the term.



Hockey Carnival

An awesome effort from our Samaritan students at today's Primary Hockey Carnival. Considering most of the players had not played hockey before, their skills by the end of the day were impressive! They played as a team with a positive attitude, despite some tough opponents. You should all be very proud of your efforts! Thanks also to our senior girls for their expertise in coaching and umpiring.

STEM at St Teresa's Campus

Makers Empire

In 2023 Samaritan Year 7 students won the Makers Empire Showcase in Adelaide with their Little Sheet Lifter (a 3D printed tool for the Doorways 2 Construction students). In 2024 we were invited back to participate again. Some year 8 students volunteered their time during lunch and after school to design, prototype and create a tool for the Doorways students again this year.

The Hinge Ninja is a 3D printed tool to help the students cut the grooves for hinges in the side of doors. They made a pitch video that demonstrated the need for the tool and the design process. They identified a problem and considered the people the problem affected (the D2C students). They generated a variety of ideas to solve the problem and then prototyped a solution. After testing and revisions the Hinge Ninja (and dust extraction port) were made in their final form.

At the 2024 Showcase the Samaritan College group did the college proud again taking away the Runner Up prize out of approximately 25 schools across the state.

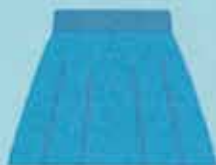
