Unfortunately, there will be unexpected incidents especially during or after extreme weather and when we have times of low rainfall.

The Samaritan Way

St Oscar Romero is a modern-day saint. One of my favourite quotes from St Oscar Romero is...

"Aspire not to have more but to be more"

Oscar Romero was born in Ciudad Barrios, a town in the mountainous east of El Salvador, on 15 August 1917. One of seven children he grew up to become a priest. In February 1977, Oscar Romero became Archbishop of San Salvador.

As Archbishop, Father Romero was a source of strength and hope for the poor and oppressed of his country. St Oscar Romero used his position to speak out for the oppressed and the vulnerable. He challenged the unjust government of his country. After calling for international intervention and as a consequence of his actions, including his pursuit for justice and peace for his people, St Oscar Romero was assassinated on 24 March 1980 as he was saying Mass in his home town. Pope Francis canonized Oscar Romero as a saint on 14 October 2018.

During this Lenten time, it is important to look at our own lives and to examine whether we are living a life that reflects our faith in Jesus. The prophet Jeremiah said "For I know the plans I have for you," declares

the Lord, "plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future. (Jeremiah 29:11)

Are we planting 'Seeds of Hope' around us? Are we looking out for everyone in our community: the poor, the vulnerable, the sick and the lonely? Are we treating the people in our community and in our world with dignity and respect? How can we give 'hope and a future' to those in our community, nation and worlds?

It helps to remember that Jesus has inspired many people to follow in his footsteps. One person who modelled his life on Jesus was Saint Oscar Romero.

Caritas Australia works to bring justice, peace and hope to those in the world who are struggling and living in poverty. Jesus asks us to come into the light of his love. We can be someone who 'Unites Against Poverty' by donating to Caritas Australia through Project Compassion this Lent.

Dear Parents and Carers,

Advocating for Safe and Respectful School Communities

Catholic School Parents South Australia (CSPSA) is committed to ensuring all students learn in safe, inclusive environments. While recent media coverage has highlighted concerns about bullying and harassment, it has also reminded us of the importance of appropriate parent and community conduct in fostering a respectful school environment. Such conduct is crucial for safeguarding the well-being of both students and staff.

While schools work within clear policies and legal frameworks, it is essential for families to lead by example, shaping positive behaviours both in person and online. Schools, families, and the broader community share the responsibility of promoting respectful relationships.

Families play a key role in shaping positive behaviours to ensure all staff and students can teach and learn in safe, supportive environments.

Addressing Bullying: Collaboration and Legislative Action

CSPSA welcomes the Federal Government's national review into bullying and will actively contribute to ensure parents' voices are heard, advocating for thoughtful, solutions-focused approaches. We also commend the South Australian Government for signing the Memorandum of Administrative Arrangement with New South Wales, reinforcing the joint commitment to tackling bullying through shared policies, frameworks, and innovative solutions.

Strengthening Protections for Students and Staff

We fully support the Education and Children's Services (Barring Notices and Other Protections) Amendment Bill 2024, which strengthens protections for students, staff, and families in school communities.

While some parents may feel more should be done, school leaders must navigate legal and privacy constraints when addressing incidents. Families with concerns are encouraged to engage directly with school leadership to seek resolution.

Supporting Families and Schools

CSPSA is here to support families by providing guidance on navigating school grievance processes and advocating for constructive resolutions. Through resources, tools, and educational seminars, we aim to empower families to understand their rights and responsibilities within the school system. Our goal is to help families address challenges effectively and promote positive school experiences for all students.

As we work through these important issues, we remain focused on collaborating with schools, policymakers, and families to create safe, inclusive, and respectful learning environments.

Student Devices

We have had a 'bring your own device' policy on this campus for several years now. As part of this program, we have reduced the number of laptops available for student loan from the library. These devices are reserved for students whose own device goes flat during the day – they are not for students who do not have their own laptop. We understand that for some families, laptops are a burdensome expense which is why we have payment plans available. Families who are yet to purchase devices for their child(ren) are asked to check out the BYOD Order Portal. Samaritan College has partnered with Learning and Technologies to provide an online purchasing portal to assist families with purchasing a laptop. This will provide families with access to:

- Devices selected by the College for school use
- Education pricing from the largest education supplier
- Multiple warranty and additional cover options
- Lay by and Interest-free financing options

Doorways2Construction

Mr Matt Thursby and our budding tradies spent their first day at our Doorways house last Friday. The building, generously provided by Housing SA, will be renovated by the Doorways team with help from local tradespeople and TAFE. The students spent the day demolishing structures in readiness to install a new kitchen and bathroom in the coming weeks and months. This program is unique to Samaritan College and during the more than 20 years it has run has helped countless students gain apprenticeships.

Jewellery

The college's grooming expectations are very clear and are agreed to by families and students upon enrolling at Samaritan. Our current uniform code states that jewellery, in general, should not be worn to school; however, the following basic items are permitted:

- A watch (no other items, including bracelets and rings, should be worn)
- One pair of earrings in each lobe. Earrings are restricted to studs, sleepers or 'huggies'. Hoops and 'dangling' earrings are not permitted.
- One crucifix or affiliated religious medal on a plain chain, worn beneath clothing

Students who regularly breach this code could have their jewellery confiscated and kept in the Front Office (to be returned at the end of the school day).


